## 3. 2002 CREATE WORKSHOP IN LISBON

CREATE, a subdivision of the European Health Psychology Society (EHPS), provides further training and promotes collaboration among early career health psychologists. To this end, it has formed an international network of early career researchers who provide mutual support and expertise. This network aids researchers in identifying and discussing common research interest and concerns. In order to provide further training and education, CREATE also organises an annual interactive workshop.

This year, the 4th CREATE workshop will be held in Lisbon, Portugal between 29th September-1<sup>st</sup> October, preceding the 16th EHPS conference. During the three-day workshop, issues related to research design and methodology in health psychology will be covered in an interactive way. This year's workshop will be facilitated by Professor John Weinman, Dr. Kavita Vedhara, and Dr. Rona Moss-Morris. John Weinman is Professor of Psychology as applied to Medicine at the Guy's, King's & St. Thomas' School of Medicine in the University of London. His main research areas are cognition and health, communication and decisionmaking in health care, and self-regulation and self-management in chronic illness. Kavita Vedhara is a Medical Research Council Career Track Scientist working for the Health Services Research Collaboration in Bristol. Her research interests focus on investigating the role of psychological and behavioural factors in disease. This includes research into psychoneuroimmunology, adherence, health beliefs and emotional disclosure. Rona Moss-Morris is a senior lecturer in Health Psychology at the University of Auckland. Her research has focused on chronic fatigue and related syndromes and the psychosocial factors that may be involved in perpetuating these illnesses. Dr Moss-Morris's other key area of research interest is investigating the impact that patients' personal beliefs about illness have on their adjustment to their condition and their health care behaviours, particularly adherence. CREATE is very happy that John Weinman, Kavita Vedhara and Rona Moss-Morris have kindly agreed to facilitate this year's workshop. We are confident that working with them in the workshop will significantly contribute to what we already know about issues on research design and methodology and will be a lot of fun.

The workshop will take place in Inatel, a holiday village in Oeiras. It is located 16 kilometres outside of Lisbon on the Atlantic coast. Accommodation will be provided in the same location and workshop participants will have access to a bar, a cafeteria and an outdoor swimming pool! Oeiras is only a 15-minute walk and has stores and shops for basic needs. We are again looking forward to having a multinational participant group working in different areas of health psychology as we did in previous years. We hope to have another successful CREATE workshop in Lisbon thanks to our professional lecturers, enthusiastic participants and experienced and committed organisers. This year, the workshop is being organised by the following CREATE members: Vera Araújo-Soares (Portugal), Lucie Byrne (UK), Wiebke Goehner (Germany), Jo Hart (Scotland), Gisela Michel (Switzerland), Rachael Powell (Scotland), Falko Sneihotta (Germany), Urte Scholz (Germany) and Ayse Uskul (Canada/Turkey). ## 4. First French Conference on Health Psychology

## UNIVERSITE VICTOR SEGALEN BORDEAUX 2, 5-6 OCTOBER 2001

The first French Conference on Health Psychology was held in Bordeaux (France) on 5-6<sup>th</sup> October 2001 under the aegis of the Société Française de Psychologie (SFP), represented by its president, professor Alain Blanchet (University of Paris 8) and the European Health Psychology Society (EHPS), represented by its founding member, Professor Stan Maes (University of Leiden, the Netherlands). It was presided by Professor Marilou Bruchon-Schweitzer. The Conference was attended by 180 French-speaking researcher-lecturers, students and health professionals working in the area of primary (health education) and tertiary (management of subjects faced with medico-hospital or professional stress prevention).

The scientific program included the following:

- \* 3 keynote speakers (J-L. Pédinielli : Explanatory theories of patients ; S. Consoli : Cardiovascular pathologies: factors of vulnerability ; G-N. Fischer: Diseases and adaptive resources: a critical approach to the notion of coping) ;
- \* 72 papers (oral presentations) divided into 12 thematic sessions (affective and cognitive factors of vulnerability and protection; medical stressors and adjustment to diseases and treatments; professional stressors; patient-carer relationships and patient management; perceptions and representations of health and diseases; prevention, and promotion of health; stress and coping; addictive behaviours; socio-cognitive approaches in health psychology; observance and quality of life, and patient-carer relationships);
  - \* 42 posters were presented in two interactive sessions.

This first congress of its kind in France led to the creation of a new learned society: the AFPSA (Association Française de Psychologie de la Santé): President: M. Bruchon-Schweitzer, Professor at Université Victor Segalen Bordeaux 2; Secretary: Elisabeth Spitz, Professor at Université de Metz, Treasurer: Danièle Hermand, Professor at Université de Lille 3. The second Conference of the AFPSA will take place in the University of Metz in 2003.

## 5. National Report for 2001-2002 from Austria

# Austrian Professional Association of Psychologists (BÖP)

In 2002 the BÖP counts about 2.300 academically trained psychologists, working in private practices or different institutions. Members are part of one or more of 9 sections (clinical and health psychology, psychotherapy, occupational/economical/organizational psychology, forensic psychology, children-youth-family psychology, school psychology, environmental psychology, traffic psychology, sport psychology). Section-leaders and the Managing Committee are voted for personally.

The BÖP-academy offers diverse curricula to members as well as non-members in clinical and health psychology, occupational psychology, supervision, coaching etc. "Psychology in Austria", published once quarterly, provides information about different topics, news and events. Last year's annual meeting "Health Psychology & Wellness" (organized by the section of clinical and health psychology) will be published in the coming issue. The congress aimed at opening new market-niches and encouraging colleagues to enter this promising field. We as the section of health psychology are very much engaged in working on health-psychological offers for wellness-institutions. We are also taking part in the working group "Austria as a wellness destination of Europe", trying to give psychology its deserved place and increase awareness about its role.

The Department of clinical and health psychology is planning a symposium on "Psychology in the Hospital", discussing thematic as well as political topics in our attempt to strengthen the role of psychology in medicine and therapeutic teams. Each section writes newsletters to its members on a regular basis, informing about new developments and upcoming events. The section of clinical and health psychology is also involved in overlooking psychology related legislature. Clinical and health psychology are being defined separately, which leads to redefining the postgraduate curricula for both professions.

Another topic of great interest is occupational psychology. In 2002 a new version of the law on security of employees was installed, which confirms the place of psychology. Until now no standardized training was offered for occupational psychology, so together with the section of occupational/ economical/ organizational psychology we have designed curricula and asked colleagues working in this field to be included in a list of "occupational psychologists". As quality assurance is a central aspect of our work, we emphasise both theoretical and practical knowledge, where health psychologists receive most of the theoretical knowledge through their curricula. We are now trying to connect occupational psychology closely to health psychology, because we think that it is a main topic of our work.

Prof. Staudinger is author of "Interactive Minds: Life-Span Perspectives on the Social Foundation of Cognition" co-edited with Paul B. Baltes. Among her research interests are the social-interactive nature of human functioning, life experience, insight and wisdom.

Prof. George VAILLANT (Harvard Medical School) Positive Aging: He is author of "Aging Well: Surprising Guideposts to a Happier Life from the Landmark Harvard Study of Adult Development" and "The Wisdom of the Ego: Sources of Resilience in Adult Life". Among his research interests are the role of defence mechanisms in positive well-being and positive aging.

Prof. Peter WARR (Sheffield) Work and Well-being: Prof. Warr won the President's Award of the BPS for outstanding contributions to psychological knowledge. He is author "Psychology at Work" (Editor). His research focuses on many aspects of employment including the relationship between work and well-being.

## MAKING SENSE OF HEALTH, ILLNESS AND DISEASE

## Monday 24th June 2002 - Wednesday 26th June 2002

## St Catherine's College, Oxford

Marking the launch of a new annual conference, research and publication series, this interdisciplinary and multi-disciplinary project aims to explore the processes by which we attempt to create meaning in health, illness and disease. The project will also examine the models we use to understand our experiences of health and illness (looking particularly at perceptions of the body), and to evaluate the diversity of ways in which we creatively struggle to make sense of such experiences and express ourselves across a range of media.

Papers, presentations, reports and workshops are invited on any of the following themes:

- the 'significance' of health, illness and disease for individuals and communities; the factors which influence our perceptions of health and illness experiences
- the concept of the 'well' person; the preoccupation with health; the attitudes of the 'well' to the 'ill'; perceptions of 'impairment' and disability; the challenges posed when confronted by illness and disease; the notion of being 'cured'; chronic illness; terminal illness; attitudes to death
- how we perceive of and conduct ourselves through the experiences of health and illness; the effects on our sense of identity; our relationship with our own body; how others perceive us - family, friends, strangers, doctors, nurses, care givers
- 'models' of the body; the body in pain; biological and medical views of illness; the ambiguous relationship with 'alternative' medicine and therapies; the doctor-patient relationship; the 'clinical gaze'; the body as machine and the role of technology; the rise of genetics; manipulation of the body transplantation, surgery; the body as resource; 'artificial' bodies; the impact of body 'models' on the person
- the impact of health, illness and disease on biology, economics, government, medicine, politics, social sciences; the changing relationship between society and medical development; the potential influences of gender, ethnicity, and class; health care, service providers, and public policy
- the nature and role of 'metaphors' in expressing the experiences of health, illness and disease for example, illness as 'another country'; the role of narrative and narrative interpretation; the importance of story telling;
- the relationship between creative work and illness and disease

### INTERNET INITIATIVE FOR DEVELOPING COUNTRIES

"The *Health InterNetwork* was created to bridge the "digital divide" in health, ensuring that relevant information - and the technologies to deliver it - are widely available and effectively used by health personnel: professionals, researchers, scientists, and policy makers.

Launched by the Secretary General of the United Nations in September 2000 and led by the World Health Organization, the *Health InterNetwork* has brought together public and private partners under the principle of ensuring *equitable access to health information*. The core elements of the project are *content, Internet connectivity* and *capacity building*.

As the first phase of making vital health content available, the *Health InterNetwork* provides a vast library of the latest information on public health: nearly 1,500 scientific publications, one of the world's largest collections of biomedical literature.

This collection is available through the efforts of WHO together with the 6 biggest biomedical publishers: Blackwell, Elsevier Science, the Harcourt Worldwide STM Group, Wolters Kluwer International Health & Science, Springer Verlag and John Wiley. The aim is to bring them together with the countries concerned to seek a more affordable pricing structure for online access to their international biomedical journals.

The "Access to Research" initiative enables accredited universities, medical schools, research centres and other public institutions in the developing countries to gain access to the wealth of scientific information contained in more than 1000 different biomedical journals produced by the six publishers. Until now, subscriptions to these journals, both electronic and print, have been priced uniformly for such institutions, irrespective of geographical location. Many key titles cost more than US\$1500 per year, and the average subscription costs several hundred dollars, putting the journals beyond the reach of the large majority of health and research institutions in the poorest countries.

The first stage of the initiative will make more than 1,000 of their journals available free or at significantly reduced charges to institutions in those countries. That availability begins with the opening of the Health InterNetwork website: A second stage will involve similar access at significantly reduced prices for institutions in the other countries. WHO and the publishers will work with the Open Society Institute of the Soros foundation network and other public and private partners to extend the initiative; for example, through training for research staff, and improving Internetconnectivity...."

## 8. CALL FOR PAPERS

### SPECIAL ISSUE ON COPING AND HEALTH

PSYCHOLOGY AND HEALTH

GUEST EDITORS: Carolyn Aldwin and Crystal Park

Papers are invited for a special issue of the journal focusing on the impact of coping on physical health. The issue has a number of aims. The first is to focus attention on the lack of sufficient research in this area. While there have been many studies on coping and mental health, far fewer studies have been done on coping and physical health outcomes, especially neuroendocrine and immune outcomes. Further, what research there is has been largely atheoretical, and more systematic attention needs to be paid to this area in order to develop adequate theoretical models.

The relationship between stress and health outcomes is highly variable, and coping has long been believed to be a primary moderator of this relationship. While current studies are suggestive, more definitive research is needed to determine which coping strategies under which contexts can either mitigate or exacerbate the effects of stressors on health outcomes. The purpose of this special issue would be to determine what is currently known about this issue, and to encourage more systematic, theoretically driven work in this area.

We invite empirical, methodological, theoretical and review papers in this area. All papers will be considered, but we are particularly keen to encourage papers in the following broad areas:

Empirical studies on the effects of coping on neuroendocrine, lipid, and immune outcomes in humans; Longitudinal studies on the effects of coping (and change in coping) on illness outcomes; Review articles which attempt to synthesize the findings, especially across health outcomes; Theoretical articles which make specific predictions about how (and why) coping should have either positive or negative effects on health outcomes.

All manuscripts that cannot be considered for this special issue will automatically be considered for publication in regular issues of the journal unless authors explicitly decline this offer. The closing date for submissions is 30th September 2002. Manuscripts should conform to normal Psychology & Health guidelines. Four copies should be sent to Carolyn Aldwin at the address given below.
